2. Agenda and Objectives

3. Progress update, final evaluation and proposed extension

3.1. Opening Speech

In absence of the State Secretary, Ms. Beate Trankmann chaired this PEB meeting. In her remarks, the main recommendations of the final evaluation were emphasized, including the request for a no-cost extension of the Programme to allow the finalization of the REDD+ National Program and its validation at the national level to reach full political commitment, before submission to the Cabinet. The institutionalization of the NFMS and SIS systems and the potential to include permafrost as a carbon pool in FRL were also highlighted. Finally, the importance of recognizing country specific contexts, while adhering to the guidance provided by UNFCCC on issues related to safeguards, governance, grievance redress mechanism, and gender, in drafting the REDD+ National Program design processes, was stressed.

3.2 Update 1: Progress on Decisions and Recommendations made at the previous meeting in April 2018

Status of decisions and recommendations marked as 'yellow' and 'red' were presented to the PEB (see Annex 2). Those decisions and recommendation will require more work before their status can be reported as completed to the Board.

3.3 Update 2: Review progress of 2018 AWP and financial report

Specific actions, including improvement of the FUG monitoring manual, formalizing the CSO Forum, also known as the Forest and Sustainable Development Council (FSDC), finalizing the UN-REDD phasing-out strategy, organizing a high-level event, disseminating studies and communication material, and clarifying the financing of REDD+, require finalization.

In terms of financial delivery, 90% has been disbursed, while an additional 5% of budgeted funds is locked in as commitments under on-going contracts bringing the estimated delivery rate for the end of the year to 95%. The items requiring decisions or guidance by the PEB were summarized by the National Programme Manager (NPM) for consideration and discussion. The relevant decisions and recommendations are noted in the following sections.

Discussion

The presentation by the NPM confirmed the need for an extension. For the Programme to submit the request to the UN-REDD Secretariat, the extension must be endorsed by the PEB. The UN-REDD Secretariat is aware of the Programme's closing date and should be able to provide a response before the end of November.

Recommendation 2/1:

The PMU must work on the recommendations marked as yellow and red from the previous PEB meeting.

3.4 Update 3: Review Programme progress and next steps – key elements of REDD+ (National Program, FRL, NFMS, SIS)

Forest Reference Level (FRL):





Following the final evaluation comments, a project proposal has been prepared to compare the maps of forest and permafrost changes and to establish their correlation.

The PEB needs to advise on next steps for the web portal (forest.atlas.mn) where forest inventory data is uploaded and changes in GHG emissions are given. The team recommends transferring the website to the Environmental Data Center to ensure its sustainability.

Discussion:

It is necessary to find a permanent home for this database over and beyond the duration of the project. The operation and maintenance of such portal requires one IT staff to run the website and one forest specialist to manage the data. The Environment Data Center and the PMU run on a different operating system. It might therefore be complicated and time-consuming to transfer the database directly to this data center.

Recommendation 3/1:

PMU to present the menu of options to hand-over the NFMS web-portal to potential host institutions, including budget and timeline and considering its long-term sustainability.

REDD+ National Program (NP):

As advised by the Chair, it is necessary to include gender and land tenure issues in the NP. The document needs yet to be completed, including financing and budget, targets' identification and verification (especially in objective 3), and the action plan. In addition, a Technical document will be developed by the CTA based on the NP. The National Forum should be organised for validation.

Discussion:

Further decision on the targets and actions is essential to estimate the budget. A clear timetable for the extension must be agreed upon to ensure the completion of the NP by the end of the extension period.

The extension period should take into account also the duration required for the legal process, including obligatory consultations and deliberations before submission to the Cabinet, duration and timelines of which are outside the realm of control of the PMU. However, the technical process underpinning the preparation of the NP can be accelerated. The final draft of the NP, technically validated with complete Annexes, would have to be available by December 15 to allow for the consultation process to be completed by the end of the suggested three months extension period of the programme. Consultations to solicit inputs from Ministries and CSOs would have to take place from January 5 to February 15.

On further analysis of the detailed timelines, it was revealed however that the equivalent of one month will be lost because of the end of year (2 weeks) and Lunar New Year (2 weeks in February) holidays reducing the suggested three months extension to de-facto 40 working days. The PEB therefore decided to recommend an extension of a total of four months to the UNREDD Secretariat for consideration to ensure full completion of the required political consultation process in relation to the National REDD Programme. The technical finalisation of the draft document will be expedited in as much as possible.





The UNFCCC requests developing countries' National Programmes or Action Plans to include governance issues related to transparency and rule of law and, to ensure stakeholder participation. REDD+ must also address land tenure and gender issues. However, these are not reflected in the current NP draft. It is important for all stakeholders to be conscious that these elements are considered an integral part of REDD+ National Programme and Strategies under the UNFCC mechanism in order to qualify for result-based payments.

Recommendation 3/2:

Complete the REDD+ NP draft by December 15 with all annexes, actions, targets, and address gender, land tenure and other issues as guided by the UNFCCC (see paragraph 72 of the Cancun Agreements).

Recommendation 3/3:

Develop a revised and detailed workplan for finalization, consultation and approval of REDD+ NP for the proposed extension period of 4 months by November 22. This will be led by the NPM in consultation with the NPD, Policy advisor, and the CTA.

Safeguards Information Systems (SIS):

Mongolia's SIS establishment requires two phases: Phase 1 (2019-2020) to provide information on how to address the Cancun Safeguards, to meet REDD+ requirements for receiving results-based payments and to support the implementation of the State Policy on Forest. Phase 2 (2021-2024) objectives are to provide information on implementation of the Cancun and other relevant safeguards and relate them to all relevant programs on climate change adaptation and mitigation in the forestry sector (supporting Mongolia's Nationally Determined Contributions to the Paris Agreement).

A SIS design has been prepared and a database will be established, including its integration with other relevant databases in Mongolia. A SIS report called "Mongolia's REDD+ Safeguard Information System: Proposed Structure, Functions and Roles" sets out a model for a future SIS database in Mongolia, based on the country's safeguards framework, consultation with stakeholders, and existing priority information systems and sources. It includes detailed information on the proposed information structure (including indicators), system functions, roles for relevant agencies and stakeholders, and proposed architecture for the SIS database, as well as recommendations for future work.

A report called 'Mongolia's REDD+ Safeguard Information System: Proposed Structure, Functions and Roles' provides information on the steps and resources needed to set up the system recommendations on SIS design elements.

Discussion:

Recommendations on institutional responsibilities have been made to the Government but have not been officially decided and formalized by the MET.

The SIS database has not been budgeted in the 2019 workplan. Whether SIS database should be kept separate from or be combined with NFMS should be further explored.. In addition, operation and maintenance (O&M) of both systems should be budgeted under REDD+ NP budget associated with corresponding actions. To ensure sustainability and institutional anchorage of the database and to guide the data collection methodology and data sharing protocols with data provisioning organisations, MET is invited to to issue an executive order.





Recommendation 3/4:

Identifying options for the establishment of NFMS and SIS databases (separated or combined) including O&M costs for the institutions to budget. Providing better guidance to the Government on how to institutionalize the web-portals and distribute the data collection responsibilities.

Recommendation 3/5:

Finalizing the policy brief on safeguards and SIS institutionalization to be submitted to the MET decision makers.

3.5 Preliminary findings of the final evaluation

The main recommendations from the final evaluation include requesting a three-month no-cost extension with the main objective of completing the REDD+ National Program, the development of a donor proposal to work on soil carbon, peatlands and permafrost layer areas, modifying or adding PAMs to increase adaptation capacity and institutionalizing the operations of the NFMS and SIS operations. Detailed findings and recommendations were presented to all key stakeholders in the targeted debriefings and the final evaluation report has been shared with all Board members.

3.6 Others

It was suggested that the IT platforms could be linked with the on-going work on the NDC at the sectoral level as well as with the GHG Inventory that is being developed by JICA. It would be ideal to have all such systems at the same organization as they are inter-connected.

A forest practices board similar to the one observed during the study tour in British Colombia could play the role of watchdog in the forestry sector. However, new activities should not be initiated during the project extension period. Instead, the PEB recommended for the Programme to conduct a desk review on possible options and functions of such a Board if there is a strong interest from the MET to pursue its establishment.

Eighteen CSOs came together and established the CSO Forum. Their registration certification will be received within a week and their first meeting will take place soon after to define their long-term vision and objectives. They would like to participate in the implementation of the REDD+ NP and work closely with the MET. An office will be made available by the CSO Forum Secretariat during the first year, and the Forum requests equipment that was procured under the programme to be transferred to support its office operations. They will be able to help with REDD+ material advocacy and dissemination. Decisions on asset transfers are expected to be reviewed and finalised by the final PEB meeting early next year assuming the programme is extended.

4. Decisions made by the PEB

4.1 Workplan extension:

The PEB agrees on requesting a four-month no-cost extension of the Programme. Ms. Beate Trankmann will seek approval by the UN_REDD Board via the UN-REDD Secretariat.

The main item of the workplan for the extension period will be the completion of the NP, in addition to the follow-up actions from the final evaluation including the sustainability of the NFMS and support to the institutionalization of the SIS (budget, institutional arrangements) and summarize recommendations for its operationalization.





4.2 Phasing-out strategy:

This document was developed after the last PEB meeting in May, but it needs formal endorsement from the PEB. It will be electronically circulated to its members, and comments will be provided by November 23. If no comments are received, the phasing-out strategy will be considered approved. It is however suggested to include a final review of the approved document at the next PEB meeting for updates that may be required in connection with work completed under the extension period.

4.3 Asset transfer

The issue has been shifted to the next PEB meeting.

4.4 Next PEB meeting:

It was agreed to hold the next PEB meeting soon after Lunar New Year, during the week of February 11, to allow enough time to go through the workplan to flag problems and discuss the phasing-out strategy and asset transfer.





5. Closing and wrap up

The following decisions were taken:

- 1) The PEB agrees on requesting a four months no-cost extension of the Programme.
- 2) Preparation of a detailed workplan for extension period and finalization of final REDD+ NP.
- 3) Timelines for the NP workplan to be provided by 23 November.
- 4) The next PEB meeting will be held immediately after the Lunar New Year, during the week of February 11. During this meeting the phasing-out strategy will be re-visited.
