What is the UN-REDD Programme?

- Established in 2008 by FAO, UNDP & UNEP in response to UNFCCC Bali Action Plan
- Offers Joint Programming & Delivering as One UN
- Collaborates with World Bank hosted FCPF, FIP and other institutions working on REDD+ activities, such as GEF, UNFCCC Secretariat and CBD
- Two components:

1. National Programmes

- Capacity building for REDD+ readiness
- 29 partner countries, 12 receiving direct support:
 - Africa: DRC, Tanzania, Zambia;
 - Asia & Pacific: Cambodia, Indonesia, Philippines, PNG, Solomon Islands, Vietnam;
 - LA & Caribbean: Bolivia, Panama, Paraguay


2. Global Programme

- Work Areas (incl. guidelines, advice, regional/ international dialogue, analyses) on
 - Monitoring, Reporting, Verification (MRV)
 - Stakeholder Engagement
 - Governance, incl. Equitable Benefit Sharing
 - Multiple Benefits; Transformation to green economies

Mandate to Develop FPIC Guidelines for the UN-REDD Programme

- 1. Recommendations from the PFII to ensure FPIC in activities
- 2. FPIC: main principle in the Operational Guidance on Engagement with Indigenous Peoples (building on 2005 UNPFII workshop on FPIC methodologies)
- 3. In response to the request of the Policy Board: To develop a set of concrete guidelines on how to implement FPIC and provide effective recourse mechanisms within the context of the UN-REDD Programme, so that we can build a body of knowledge and experience to inform FPIC processes and recourse mechanisms for REDD+ in the future.





Consultation Process

. In consultation with IP/CSO representatives, designed a series of regional consultations with Indigenous Peoples to define principles of Free, Prior, and Informed Consent (FPIC) and recourse mechanism:

- Asia/Pacific region: Viet Nam, June 2010
- Latin America/Caribbean: Panama, October 2010
 - Africa: Tanzania, January 2011





Common Elements

- Worked with IP and CSO partners and partner country UN staff to identify representatives
- Mix of Indigenous peoples and civil society organizations and networks and UN staff - (mostly) no government representatives
- IP and CSO representatives to the Policy Board, including PFII Chair, key in the workshop design process and participated in cross-regional meetings
- Four day agenda: first day basics of REDD, second day basics and perspectives on FPIC; 3rd and 4th day small group work and plenary discussion for input
- Evolving agenda and working groups that built on each other
- •Fully participatory iterative process of reviewing draft guidelines UN-REDD and workshop reports after each consultation



Asia/Pacific Region: Viet Nam

- Four day meeting in Hanoi, Viet Nam (June 2010)
- 68 participants from 15 countries
- Organizations represented: AIPP, AMAN, FPP, Tebtebba, TFD, UNDP RIPP, etc.
- Structure of workshop designed in consultation with indigenous peoples, the IP representatives for the region, including the PFII chair and the UNDP Regional Indigenous Peoples' Programme
- Five working groups looking at Free, Prior, Informed, Consent, and Recourse mechanisms
- Builds on and critiques the example of piloting FPIC for the UN-REDD Programme in Lam Dong province, Viet Nam



Latin America and the Caribbean: Panama

ROGRAMME

- Four day meeting in Gamboa, Panama (October 2010)
- 55 participants from 15 countries
- Organizations represented: APA, BIC, COONAPIP, COICA, FAPI, FCPF, FPP, IAITPTF, IPAM, TFD, etc.
- Structure of workshop designed in consultation with indigenous peoples, including the IP representatives for the region
- •Evolving working groups: Viet Nam guidelines; activities where FPIC applies, consultation, recourse (in English and Spanish)
- Builds on and critiques the draft guidelines arrived at in Viet Nam.



Africa: Tanzania

- Four day meeting in Arusha, Tanzania (January 2011)
- 56 participants from 16 countries (including a Tanzania government representative)
- Organizations represented: MPIDO, IPACC, FPP, BIC, TFD, FCPF, etc.
- Structure of workshop designed in consultation with indigenous peoples, including the IP representatives for the region
- •Builds on and critiques a draft combining advice received in Panama and Viet Nam
- •Evolving working groups looking at combined draft; consultation; activities where FPIC applies; recourse (in English and French)



Next Steps

ROGRAMME

- 1. Recommendations from three regional workshops analyzed for similarities and differences, one set of guidelines with regional distinctions synthesized and distributed for a public comment period mid-June 2011
- 2. Comprehensive draft guidelines circulated globally for comment and input mid-June to end of July 2011
- 3. Revised draft of comprehensive guidelines finalized September 2011
- 4. Guidelines presented to UN-REDD Policy Board and annexed to the Joint FCPF/UN-REDD Harmonized Guidance on the Engagement of Indigenous Peoples and other Forest Dependent Communities October 2011
- 5. Support to sensitization and capacity building for government counterparts to implement guidelines October 2011 onwards
