In partnership with United Nations Member States with significant interest in advancing Reducing Emissions from Deforestation and Forest Degradation in Developing Countries (REDD), it is my great honour to invite you to speak at a special high-level side event on REDD to be held during the opening of the 64th General Assembly session on 23 September 2009 from 4:30 p.m. to 6 p.m. in the ECOSOC Chamber at United Nations Headquarters.

A strong readiness phase is essential for successful implementation of REDD actions in the future.

The special event will also aim to underline the importance of a strong, global partnership to make REDD work, including the importance of coordination, information sharing and innovative and collaborative efforts among tropical forest countries, the United Nations system, the World Bank, and bilateral donors, as well as civil society actors

During this special event, a panel of Heads of State and Government from developing and developed countries committed to strong action on REDD will highlight their commitment to prepare for, implement and finance REDD in the short, medium and long-term. There will also be a discussion among Heads of State and Government and key experts focused on solutions and the way forward

The remaining tropical forests of the world are global treasures. A genuine opportunity is now emerging to secure them for future generations, while achieving climate benefits and furthering sustainable development. I invite your engagement, commitment and leadership in this endeavour and look forward to you joining me at this special event on REDD.
