UN-REDD Programme: Anti-Corruption Scope of Work

- Tailored, country-specific responses
- Sharing responsibility for managing corruption risks
- Working from a risk-based approach
 - Facilitate in-country governance/corruption assessments undertaken through multi-stakeholder processes
 - Risk Assessment Tool for social standards : Assess integrity of fiduciary systems, transparency and accountability risks (and other governance and livelihoods criteria)
- Activities to include :
 - Support multi-stakeholder consultations in design of national REDD+ frameworks
 - Support civil society in oversight activities
 - Train Anti-Corruption units on REDD+, and REDD+ institutions on anti-corruption
 - Economic and social impact assessments to help determine vested interests
 - Ensuring independent, effective and accessible recourse and compaints REDD mechanism
